## LEAD & COPPER RULE MONITORING AND REPORTING VIOLATION MANDATORY LANGUAGE - TIER III

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

Williamson County M.U.D. #10 has violated the monitoring and reporting requirements set by Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in Chapter 30, Section 290, Subchapter F. Even though these were not emergencies, as our customers, you have the right to know what happened and what we are doing to correct these situations.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During June 1 – September 30, 2016 we did not monitor or test for lead and copper and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water during that time.

The table below lists the contaminant(s) we did not properly test for during the last year, how often we are supposed to sample for these contaminants, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken, and the date on which the follow-up samples will be taken.

## What is being done?

Williamson County M.U.D. #10 collected samples in 2015. 90<sup>th</sup> percentile copper results from those samples exceeded the reduced monitoring limit of 0.65 mg/L, as set forth by TCEQ. The system did not exceed the 1.3 mg/L action limit. The system's 90<sup>th</sup> percentile copper result was 0.76 mg/L. Due to this result exceeding the copper threshold, the system was moved from reduced monitoring every third year to an annual monitoring requirement. The system was not notified of this change and did not sample, resulting in the monitoring violation. This level does not constitute a health risk. The system is scheduled to collect samples again between June 1 and September 30, 2017.

Please share this information with all other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (i.e., people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in a public place or distributing copies by hand or mail.
